A **FREE** workshop for restoring
your forest and rangeland

WASHINGTON STATE UNIVERSITY

The Taylor Bridge Fire burned 23,500 acres of forest and farmland. Without active management, much of this land could take decades to reestablish desired vegetation, if at all. This workshop will help you assess the impacts to your forest and range property, and provide you with ideas and assistance opportunities for restoring forest and rangeland resources.



Discussion topics include:

- How to assess tree survival following a fire
- Forest insect concerns, such as bark beetle and western spruce budworm
- Wildlife habitat—how to create and manage for wildlife after a wildfire
- Erosion concerns and how to mitigate
- Grazing management after wildfire—assessing fire impacts and planning effective rangeland rehabilitation
- Reforestation
- Protecting your home and forest from wildfire
- Forest practices and how it may affect future management
- Salvage options (if any), and working with a consulting forester
- Noxious and invasive weed concerns
- Financial, technical, and educational assistance programs

AFTER THE BURN WORKSHOP

INFORMATION

Workshop will be held at the Unionville Ranch arena. There will be chairs for seating. Afternoon discussions will include a short walk to learn how to assess fire severity and vegetation impacts.

Bring a lunch, appropriate clothing, and comfortable walking shoes. Refreshments will be provided.

DIRECTIONS

Unionville Ranch, 1750 Emerick Road, is located 15 minutes from Cle Elum and about 30 minutes from Ellensburg, overlooking Hidden Valley and the Swauk Canyon.

FROM CLE ELUM: Drive east on SR 970 to Hidden Valley Road, 8 miles east of Cle Elum. Turn right on Hidden Valley Road, follow that road 1.5 miles where Hidden Valley Road will turn into Emerick Road. Travel up the hill on Emerick road until you see the signs for Unionville Ranch.

FROM ELLENSBURG: Travel north on US 97 for 18 miles until US 97 comes to a complete stop. Turn left onto SR 970 (towards Cle Elum) and travel 2.2 miles. Turn left on Hidden Valley Road and follow the directions above.
